WELCOME MESSAGE

MOVING FORWARD WITH JUSTICE AND INNOVATION

On behalf of **Legal Aid of Western Ohio, Inc.**, I am pleased to share our Annual Report for 2022. The past year was one of transition and progress as we began to operate in a post-pandemic world. This meant making significant changes to improve the client experience across our 32-county service area and in our state-wide services to agricultural workers, as well as developing thoughtful and innovative ways to accommodate staff as they navigated a hybrid work environment.

Reestablishing face-to-face communications was crucial in helping **LAWO** move forward with our mission of serving the civil legal needs of low-income households. Through a concentrated effort to provide more in-person outreach and legal assistance, we saw a significant increase in our client numbers in 2022. Additionally, we were able to build stronger relationships and collaborate more effectively with community partners to address the varied needs of our clients and communities by meeting in person. Examples of this included our SAFE Project (Safety and Accessibility for Everyone) assessments with Bethany House in northwest Ohio, and our collaboration with Advocates for Basic Legal Equality, Inc. (ABLE) and HUD in expanding our housing services to rural communities outside of Montgomery County.

Transitioning out of the pandemic brought more staff members back into our offices on a regular basis. To accommodate employees from the various places where they conduct their work, we sought to improve our use of technology. Projects included the implementation of our new intranet site, and the beginning stages of introducing LegalServer as our new case management system and NetDocuments as our document management system.

LAWO went through a rebranding in 2022. Our new logo and branding assets reflect our commitment to people, community, and diversity.

Also in 2022, **LAWO** conducted a Community Legal Needs Assessment with our partner, the Center for Community Solutions. An assessment was sent to hundreds of people living in poverty asking them about their legal needs, their experiences in accessing help, and the resources (or lack thereof) available to them. We also created a survey for our community partners to complete, asking them to weigh in on some of the common requests, services, and gaps in assistance for our community members living in poverty, and conducted focus groups and individual interviews. The results from the assessment will guide our mission and focus over the next several years.

Agricultural Workers and Outreach

LAWO conducts extensive outreach to the agricultural worker population and provides legal assistance to clients identified through outreach activities. In 2022, COVID-19 continued to create outreach-related challenges as we sought to reach as many agricultural workers as possible while maintaining staff safety. We provided workers with a "Legal Bag" containing numerous educational tools and collaborated with Justice for Migrant Women to provide items such as masks, disinfectants, toiletries, and hygiene items. In 2022, LAWO visited 261 agricultural camps in 48 of the 64 counties identified as having seasonal and migrant farmworkers. The outreach staff visited 706 housing units; reached 3074 workers: distributed 2507 harvest calendars, which include summaries of laws pertaining to employment, domestic violence, education, field sanitation, housing, and immigration; distributed 2299 work record books, which provide agricultural workers with a means of documenting the dates and hours of employment and their wages received; and distributed 2366 heat stress handouts. We also distributed 2346 COVID-19 CDC Factsheets in Spanish and English. Additional outreach was conducted at area restaurants and agencies.

Empowering Older Adults

LAWO's Access to Justice Practice Group and Senior Project continued to collaborate to provide legal services to older adults in 2022. We successfully represented this population in consumer debt collection cases, bankruptcy cases to protect income or a home, housing conditions and housing preservation cases, and health care and public benefits cases. Outcomes included reduction or elimination of debt; relief from creditor harassment; income and asset preservation; housing stability; health care assistance, and income maintenance.

Through our **Plan Ahead and Protect Yourself Legal Series**, older adults
participated in free legal education classes
and clinics that helped them achieve
peace of mind through the completion of
advance directives and other planning
documents. These services made it
possible for our clients to remain in their
homes and neighborhoods, living
independent and autonomous lives for as
long as possible.

To address the growing challenge of elder abuse, and increase the help available, LAWO offered free Legal Needs Check-Ups for older adults ages 60+ in our service area. The Check-Ups were available throughout the month of June (Elder Abuse Awareness Month) as a telephone-based service through our central intake unit, Legal Aid Line. The Legal Needs Check-Up consisted of approximately 15 questions that helped identify whether the caller had legal issues that we or one of our partners could assist with.

Housing Justice and Community Economic Development

In 2022, LAWO greatly expanded our housing advocacy in the City of Toledo. Toledo City Council passed a **Right to Counsel in Eviction Proceedings** ordinance (RTC) in 2021, providing \$250,000 in funding for the first year of the project. In 2022, we hired two attorneys to provide representation for tenants under the RTC Project. RTC staff assisted clients in 227 eviction cases in the Toledo Municipal Court in 2022, providing comprehensive representation in 210 cases. Advocates closed 139 cases, preventing an eviction in 62 cases and delaying an eviction in 60 cases. In total, 88% of households who received representation were able to avoid an eviction or an involuntary move. RTC attorneys also helped clients seal their eviction records in 46 cases.

LAWO attorneys also worked closely with community partners in 2022 to ensure that they reached the hardest to serve clients, and to provide referrals for matters outside our legal skillset. LAWO, along with our community partners and under the direction of the Toledo Lucas County Homelessness Board, formed the **Eviction Prevention League**. Under the newly signed Memorandum of Understanding, this group meets regularly to discuss the big picture and individual needs in the local homelessness and housing landscape.

Pro Bono Representation

After creating a virtual training video and written materials in 2021, LAWO's Pro Bono Program and the Toledo Bar Association Pro Bono Legal Services Program continued to use those resources to support pro bono attorneys in helping clients seal their criminal records. The materials incorporated new statutory changes and included informational sheets and a process by which all volunteer attorneys can easily access criminal records and check for eligibility.

Additionally, our Pro Bono Program collaborated with law firms and justice community partners throughout our 32-county service area to host a variety of pro se clinics on family law, domestic violence, and driver's license reinstatements. We also partnered with the Ohio Access to Justice Foundation's **Justice Bus** to provide mobile clinic services to reach vulnerable populations in our rural counties.

Safety & Stability for Domestic Violence Survivors

LAWO remained engaged in two innovative projects to meet the needs of domestic violence survivors: the SAFE (Safety & Accessibility For Everyone) Project and the Justice for Families Project in Lucas County.

Women with disabilities are uniquely vulnerable to all forms of gender-based violence and experience higher rates of victimization than women without disabilities. Shelters and other systems-based supports are often physically or procedurally inaccessible.

Additionally, culturally competent services are non-existent, making it even more difficult for survivors of color to get help.

In 2022, the **SAFE Project** finalized and began to implement a strategic plan based on a needs assessment conducted in 2021. The assessment identified six key findings and fifteen strategic plan activities that will be implemented at all partner agencies over the next year. Implementation of each activity will make SAFE partner agencies better equipped to provide safe and appropriate services to survivors with disabilities.

Additionally, LAWO and its partners, The Lucas County Court Juvenile Court, the Children's Rights Collaborative, and Bethany House, began to implement a DOJ grant to enhance services to domestic violence survivors involved in the Juvenile court system in Lucas County. The **Justice for Families Project** uses a specialized intake center at the juvenile court to screen for domestic violence and prioritizes representing parents experiencing domestic violence to increase safety and stability for families.

A multi-disciplinary team meets twice a month to review cases and create individualized action plans for survivors and their families. The action plans ensure survivors receive wrap-around services that address the unique safety issues of survivors and their families when they are involved in the juvenile court system.

In 2022, LAWO continued to collaborate with rural Victim Assistance Programs and other domestic violence advocates to increase our representation of survivors in our rural areas. The advocates referred many victims to LAWO for continued legal representation. LAWO received referrals for representation for victims in domestic violence civil protection order cases, stalking civil protection order cases, sexually oriented offense cases, juvenile protection order cases, divorce cases, and contested custody cases. LAWO also aided in other areas of law, such as survivors 'rights and housing.

In the rural counties covered by LAWO's Sandusky office, we focused on both direct representation of domestic violence survivors and systemic change to improve the opportunities for domestic violence survivors throughout our service areas. Examples of our systemic work included active involvement with the rural county domestic violence task forces, training nurses at local hospitals to document suspected domestic violence in patient records, and working with the courts to make sure survivors who appear in court are directed to the resources available in Sandusky County and regionally. For example, the court in Richland County attempted to use a single interpreter when both parties were Deaf. We entered an appearance for the survivor and educated the court on the need for an interpreter for each Deaf party. The court then made the policy change resolving the issue for future cases involving Deaf parties. At the same time, we also enabled our client to obtain a civil protection order to stop the domestic violence.

Veterans

LAWO expanded its services to veterans in 2022. We signed a Memorandum of Understanding with a veteran-serving organization in the Defiance area and with another based in Fremont. With these two additions, LAWO has signed Memorandums of Understanding with four veteran-serving organizations that cover much of our service area. We maintained relationships with other veteran-serving organizations and veteran interest groups, and regularly met with veteran-serving organizations to provide staff training and consultation to identify and address the unique legal issues most common to veterans. LAWO successfully represented veterans in the areas of housing, debt collection, benefits, family law, and others to prevent homelessness and improve stability. Outcomes include evictions prevented, SSI benefits maintained, name change achieved, civil protection order assistance, and others. We represented 179 veterans in 2022.







STORIES FROM THE COMMUNITY



Neveah Prevails in Subleasing Eviction Case



Neveah* had been subleasing her apartment from her friend Christy* and was paying her portion of the rent directly to Christy. She never had any reason to doubt that Christy was paying the rent in a timely manner to the landlord. When Christy decided to move out, Neveah contacted the landlord to ask for a written lease and said that she would be willing to pay the full rent amount. In response, the landlord filed an eviction action against her.




Neveah called LAWO's Legal Aid Line and was assigned a legal aid housing attorney with experience in eviction cases. Neveah's attorney was able to negotiate for time for her to move out. The landlord was suing both Neveah and Christy for the back rent, plus other monetary damages. However, LAWO argued that Neveah should be dismissed from the lawsuit, noting that she could not be held to the terms of a lease that she never agreed to. The judge found in favor of Neveah.

Neveah was relieved that she did not have a judgment against her, which could have hurt her credit score and led to her wages being garnished.

STORIES FROM THE COMMUNITY



Peatriz Receives Protection Order Against **Abusive Husband**

Beatriz* has a disability that prevents her from hearing and speaking which she has had since birth. She uses an American Sign Language interpreter to communicate, and her preferred communication method is through email.

Beatriz is married but has no children with her husband (the respondent). Her husband physically abused Beatriz throughout their marriage. The last time he was physically violent was in the summer of 2022 when he punched Beatriz and left bruises. She took photos of those bruises.

The most recent episode of abuse took place on October 4, 2022. Respondent, who owns firearms, mimicked a gun with his finger and kept pointing it at Beatriz's head saying he was going to kill her. Beatriz was frightened and she knew that she was vulnerable. She contacted her daughter, who understands American Sign Language. Her daughter reached out to the police, and three officers came to the home and arrested the respondent. Beatriz filed for a Civil Protection Order (CPO). Because of the difficulty of getting an American Sign Language interpreter, she and her advocate decided not to seek an ex-parte order.

Beatriz contacted LAWO, and we filed a notice of appearance in her CPO. The respondent also obtained an attorney. On the day of the final hearing, we negotiated a 2 1/2 -vear protection order. In addition, the respondent was to sell his guns and ammunition, and Beatriz was to receive half the proceeds. Respondent is also responsible for the parties' mortgage payment in the approximate amount of \$966 per month, and the real estate taxes of \$1,132.67 for the first six months of 2023.

2022 ACCESS TO JUSTICE

The annual **Northwest Ohio Access to Justice Awards Dinner** took place in person after a twoyear hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. More
than 300 guests attended the event, held on May
12, 2022, at The Pinnacle in Maumee in support of **LAWO**, Advocates for Basic Legal Equality (ABLE),
and the Toledo Bar Association Pro Bono Legal
Services Program (TBA) and our combined efforts
to assist people living in poverty with critical legal
services.



Keynote speaker, the **Honorable Glenda Hatchett**, provided motivation and encouragement to the audience and discussed the importance of keeping one's purpose and passion in the legal field, despite the challenges that legal professionals and support staff face.

Judge Hatchett was Georgia's first African American Chief Presiding Judge of a state court and head of one of the largest juvenile court systems in the country. She is a graduate of Emory University School of Law and an Earl Warren Scholar. Judge Hatchett has keynoted several national conferences, including the Diversity Conference in the U.S. Senate, the Minority Employer's Conference at Newell Rubbermaid, Home Depot's Women's History Speaker's Series, and Black Enterprise's Entrepreneurs Conference. She has received many awards, including the Outstanding Jurist of the Year, Atlanta affiliate of the National Bar Association;

Roscoe Pound Award, National Council on Crime and Delinquency; and the Thurgood Marshall Award, NAACP, among others. Since 2016, Judge Hatchett has starred in the television court series, *The Verdict*.

During the dinner, LAWO, ABLE, and TBA honored three individuals and an organization for their extraordinary service to people living in poverty in northwest Ohio.

The 2022 Public Interest Law Award was awarded to James F. Nooney, Sr., a member of Eastman & Smith and Toledo-area attorney who has been practicing law for 54 years. Nooney was recognized for his dedication to serving the community through pro bono work, and his commitment to assisting clients through TBA's Pro Bono Program with the complicated paperwork associated with guardianships. Providing legal services to those unable to pay for them is a core feature of Nooney's professional identity. He believes that providing pro-bono services is the responsibility of all professionals, particularly lawyers. He often encourages his colleagues and newer associates to take on pro bono work.

Two individuals received **2022 Community Advocacy Awards** for their roles in fostering change through community organizing.

Beatriz Maya, a co-founder of the nonprofit organization La Conexion, received the award for her endless pursuit of empowering immigrants, refugees, farmworkers, and the Latinx community. Her advocacy began decades ago when she worked for the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC), doing everything in her power to bring education and justice to migrant farmworkers. Maya was instrumental in forming the Northwest Ohio Immigrant Rights Network (NWOIRN) in 2019. The network of advocates and allies is comprised of immigrant-based organizations, advocacy groups, and individuals acting in solidarity with our immigrant community to build humane, just, inclusive, safe, equitable, and welcoming communities for everyone.

David L. Beckwith received the award posthumously for his contributions as a community organizer for many decades. Beckwith's local organizing efforts began in 1981 when he assumed the role of director of the East Toledo Community Organization, focusing on housing and neighborhood issues, including the environment and economic development. Known as a community mentor for social justice and environmental activists in the Toledo community, Beckwith touched the lives of many and motivated others to understand that they had the power to lead and to hold people accountable for their actions. Beckwith's daughter, Schuyler, accepted the award on behalf of the family.

The **2022 Distinguished Service Award** was given to **Dana Incorporated** for its long history of service to legal aid and the Medical-Legal Partnership for Children (MLPC) in Toledo. Creating the Corporate Counsel Legal Aid Fellowship in 2013, Dana's Legal Department formed a unique partnership among the counsel of the major corporations in northwest Ohio with ABLE and LAWO. Their support expanded the capacity of the firms to serve more vulnerable families through the MLPC, which addresses the social determinants of health through partnering with medical providers. Dana's assistance allowed the MLPC to grow and garner other financial support, helping nearly 3,500 people in poverty between 2013 and 2021.

STORIES FROM THE COMMUNITY

Barry and Levi Receive Legal Aid Assistance for Special Education Services

Barry*, a white veteran with a disability and a single father of two children, contacted Legal Aid seeking assistance with obtaining special education services for his youngest child, Levi.* Levi has learning disabilities, and Barry did not believe Levi's school was providing him with the appropriate support to be successful. Levi was having particular challenges transitioning back to an in-person educational school environment after remote learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Barry's LAWO attorney advocated for a new school schedule to help Levi transition back to an in-person learning environment. The attorney also advocated for an appropriate Individualized Education Program that reflected Levi's placement and service needs. A Functional Behavior Assessment to document Levi's behaviors and a Behavior Intervention Plan to address behaviors were also put in place. The attorney also provided information and resources on special education law and advocacy to ensure Levi's long-term success in school.


